

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation: A valid CPR credential includes CPR cards, course rosters, or a letter from the CPR Instructor attesting to the applicants successful completion of a CPR program. The card or letter must clearly indicate that the course included adult, child, and infant CPR and airway obstruction relief maneuvers, including two rescuer CPR and barrier devices. The following CPR credentials are acceptable for EMT certification below;
